e's one of the true torch bearers of Indian culture and tradition — ingeniously evolv-Indian ing with the times, making modern and ancient meet half way and reincarnating his ancestors' beliefs and princi-ples. And he does it all with the deft touch of a knife and chisel.

I used to be able to paint, sketch and sculpt meticuloussketch and sculpt meticulous ly well even as a school stu-dent and was quite surprised by how well I took to the art. I later understood that it was in later understood that it was in my DNA. My ancestors were the pre Vedic race of Vaastu Shilpis, spoken of in the vedas, puranas and itihasa, and it was upto me to keep up their legacy," says Dakshinamoorthy.

The application of nature's principles in art is a language in itself that will live on forever, no matter where we go or reside," he remarks eggely. remarks, sagely.

But Dakshinamoorthy is also humble enough to admit that even after decades of experience, he is still learnexperience, he is still learning and trying to reach the levels that the ancient legendary sculptors once immortalised. "Even with all the advancement in science and technology, our skill levels still fall below their prestigious works. These monuments are the true remnants of those times, and I'll do all I can to preserve them," he muses.

The founder of Vivek Vedic Architects, Dakshinamoorthy Architects, Dakshinamoorthy also oversees the operations of the Vaastu Vedic Research Foundation, which was left in his charge by the renowned heritage expert Dr. V. Ganapati Sthapati. His main motive is to continue their international research in securing the future of ancient relics, and finding a balance between modern science and ancient principles. ancient principles.

"But we need a lot of funding to continue our work.
When we go abroad to work, When we go abroad to work, people are in awe of our culture, and we are paid a lot of respect, especially when I quote from our literature. One of my more memorable experiences was when I was constructing the Sri Venkateshwara temple in the U.K., with granite. We carved it from stone and transported it to England. We are sure that the monument will find its mark in history," he says.
